RE: Enactment Review for the Uniform Unincorporated Entity Acts

The following report serves as a legislative review of the uniform unincorporated entity acts during the 2022 legislative session as of March 9, 2022.

Additional notes:

- Wisconsin: Senate concurred in Assembly changes on February 23, 2022. Bills will be presented to Governor for signature by the end of March. Wisconsin legislature meets year-round and is in session from January to June 2022.
- Maryland: Lisa Jacobs has been working with Steve Leites and the Maryland Bar Association on RULLCA.
- New Mexico: Jack Burton reached out and said one of our NM commissioners who is also a legislator is interested in pursuing RULLCA over the next few years. New Mexico is in a

budget-only session this year, so introduction would be for 2023.

- Minnesota: Commissioner Kim Lowe is asking the Secretary of State and other state offices for feedback on MoRAA.
- Nebraska: Steve Willborn is considering MoRAA for the 2023 session.
- Missouri: RULLCA was introduced in the House and has not yet been scheduled for a hearing.
- North Carolina: The General Statutes Commission is going to review MoRAA for possible introduction in North Carolina.
- Rhode Island: RULPA and RUPA were introduced and had a hearing on March 8, 2022. The Senate held the bills for further consideration. In addition, the Rhode Island Bar Association's Business Law Section is reviewing RULLCA and will prepare a bill draft for introduction.
- West Virginia is considering updates to its business entity acts for the 2023 session.
